Lutheran Schools Week

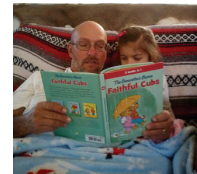
Theme: "God's Kids. Our Kids"

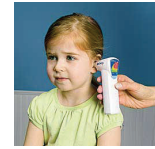

Our Savior's Lutheran School is preparing for its annual **Trike-A-Thon** to be held on March 31st and April 1st. During this 2-day event, all OSLS preschoolers and Pre-K students are encouraged to bring their own trike, bike, or non-motorized scooter to ride around a designated course for a 15-minute period. Meet the Masters

Our young artists (grades 1st-5th) will be studying Italian artist, *Leonardo Da Vinci* (1452-1519). Renaissance artist, *Leonardo Da Vinci*, is best known for his realistic portraits. He was a master at studying the lines and shape of a person's face. He very slowly and carefully observed the texture, shapes and unique details for his drawings and oil paintings. The children will use markers, q-tips and water to create Portrait Line Drawings.



Inside the Outdoors Field Trip-*Wild Wetlands*

March 4th

Our second grade class will be visiting the Muth Interpretive Center on the bluffs of the largest Wetland in Orange County. Coastal bluffs, marshes, mudflats and open water provide a wide diversity of habitats for students to explore.

*Using binoculars to observe birds and search for animal evidence, the children will discover why wetlands are important in the natural world.

*On a scavenger hunt, they will discover the life at the wetland and the homes they create.

*Students will become osprey, fish or worms and play a game to understand their roles in the food chain.

That is not the case here at Our Savior's Lutheran School, where 100% of our fifth grade students score proficient or above. Looking at how we compare to other fifth grade students nationally, our students' average math scores are in the top 4% of the nation.
